



Impact Report 2024-2025

*Featured in this report are many of the pets we were able to help with your support, from **August 2024 to August 2025**, keeping them healthy and at home with their families. Over 45 pets were helped during this time period, for a total of \$22,700 in support, primarily with emergent veterinary care.*

We continue to create partnerships with veterinarians throughout Central Florida to discount care, and FFAF funds are paid directly to their offices. FFAF also seeks out opportunities to participate in community events and apply for grants. Currently our work is 100% supported by individual donations and matching employer donations.

FFAF's work was featured on Channel 13 News' Feel Good Friday segment in January 2025, and highlighted a couple pets we helped in the past who now pay it forward.

Many of the Pets Assisted:

August 2025: Ampster and his dad are moving to Puerto Rico. We covered a health certificate and updated shots for Ampster so that he can go with dad. (\$350)



< August 2025: Mimi is a lovely cat who belongs to a wonderful mom with vision impairment on a fixed income. She used her rent money for Mimi's care. Mimi needed a dental badly and had stopped eating. We needed to get her to the vet quickly. (\$700)

June 2025; We helped these two pups, Ruffy & Sassy, whose "teeth are rotting out of their mouths" - with bloodwork and dentals. We were able to get these babies comfortable after their mom's expensive battle with cancer. (\$300) >



May 2025: Smoochie's mom had more than half of what's needed for a bronchoscopy procedure, but was a bit short. Smoochie's mom is a tireless animal rescuer who also does TNR to support community cats. (\$350)



< May 2025: Duncan was rescued from a neglectful situation. He was severely anemic from fleas, had a triple ear infection, tons of worms, and other issues. We also sent a bunch of food to help slowly put some weight on him. (\$1,000)

April 2025: Pebbles had some very scary gastro symptoms and issues with her eyes. Her care couldn't wait, so we made sure she got into the vet and on meds (\$700).

April 2025: When a local rescuer asks for help for a personal pet, we can't say no. If you've ever met a rescuer, you know a lot of our funds go to help animals that aren't ours. Spencer needed a dental so we helped to offset the cost for mom. (\$200) >



April 2025: Skye needed a tumor removed and a spay. (\$500)

April 2025: Romino needed to get a tumor off his chest, so we partnered with Hurleys Haven Vet Care. (\$400)



< April 2025: Delilah's family reached out to us because she was in pain. After an emergency visit, it was clear something was still wrong and there were no more resources to get her care. We stepped in for bloodwork and xrays to reveal that she has some arthritis in her spine. With meds and supplements on board, we hope this girl has a pain-free future ahead. (\$600)

February 2025: We partnered with Hurleys Haven Vet Care to take care of Chico's dental. We were happy to offset the cost of his care and to work with his family. (\$400)

February 2025: Nina had a tumor that needed to be removed and biopsied. We offset the costs to make sure it doesn't spread. (\$300)

January 2025: General Tweety ate a foreign object and was obstructed. Helping Hands Vet pulled his dog brother's snuffle mat out of his stomach and intestines when we stepped in. Mom is disabled. (\$2,500) >



January 2025: Franklin had an acute asthma attack and was having trouble breathing. His life was in danger, so we sent him to urgent care to ensure he could breathe and get the treatment he needed (\$500)

December 2024: We sponsored Bunnie's entropion eyelid surgery, working with Hurleys Haven Vet Care. (\$400)

< November 2024: Tiki went missing for TWO MONTHS and was found with a badly broken tail that needed to be amputated ASAP. Her family was so happy to have her home. (\$400)

November 2024: Gizmo wasn't feeling well at all and needed some bloodwork and medicine. The vet was able to prescribe medication to get Gizmo back on the road to recovery.(\$300)

November 2024; Camo needed some wet food to keep that belly full and we were happy to step in and make sure he had enough to hold him over for quite some time. (\$85)



< October 2024: Patches was attacked by a dog and needed surgery, so we chipped in. (\$165)

October 2024: We sponsored canine Sadie's spay. (\$200)


October 2024: CindyCat was adopted by a 72 year old woman after the cat's 94 year old mom passed away. She had a tooth abscess and desperately needed an extraction. (\$400)

October 2024: Larry got hit by a car and needed about \$900 in diagnostics and treatment. He was hit and run – the truck did not stop. Mom spent everything she has, so we worked along with another charity to ensure he got the emergency care he needed. (\$300)

October 2024: Bella had a very painful ear hematoma and we paid for half of her surgery. (\$300) >

October 2024: Dea was in distress with urinary stones or crystals, so we chipped in for a urine culture and xrays. (\$385)

September 2024: Dasher desperately needed a dental and exploration of a growth in his mouth. However she has a heart murmur, so we helped with bloodwork and testing for cardiac clearance. (\$675)



September 2024: Baby was very sick and needed bloodwork and meds. Mom was prepared to surrender her so that she could get the help she needed. (\$500)

"I am Baby's mama. Thank you so much to everyone. We are beyond grateful for the help and I'm happy to say we've been seizure free since the last one early yesterday morning. Thank you doesn't even begin to cover it, but know you didn't just help our family member....you saved our entire family yesterday. Baby is happily relaxing on the balcony this morning, almost back to her usual self."

September 2024: Anubis has allergies along with a spate of other healthcare issues. His person was a Pulse nightclub shooting survivor, and spent every penny trying to help this best friend. We helped with Anubis's allergy meds and ongoing care. (\$450)



< August 2024; Jasper is two years old and was at the emergency vet with a urinary blockage. The bill was astronomical, as he needed catheterization and a long stay. Mom works in the service industry and this was a huge reach for her. (\$525)
